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this book is a compilation of real cases submitted by social workers and faculty teaching social work courses the cases help students understand how clients issues and agencies interact as well as see how that understanding connects with the actual doing of generalist social work practice the cases reflect a broad range of courses in the social work curriculum and the most current cswe standards

statisticians know that the clean data sets that appear in textbook problems have little to do with real life industry data to better prepare their students for all types of statistical careers academic statisticians now strive to use data sets from real life statistical

problems this book contains 20 case studies that use actual data sets that have not been simplified for classroom use each case study is a collaboration between statisticians from academe and from business industry or government this book is the result of a collaborative workshop of statisticians focusing on academic industrial partnerships the cases come from a wide variety of application areas including biology environment medical and health care pharmaceutical marketing and survey research and manufacturing

writing primarily for student and newly qualified teachers whose classroom experience is necessarily limited the author takes pains to elucidate why to assess what to assess and how to assess

while many books have been written about basic literacy few offer detailed information on how to plan and carry out a community literacy project fewer still give guidance in tackling the additional barriers of language culture and logistics in developing countries and in treating the local community as an active partner rather than a passive recipient in the literacy process in local literacies theory and practice glenys waters includes these elements and presents a practical guide for developing a literacy program beginning with a discussion of the theories of learning and reading the author provides a detailed description of how to plan and organize a literacy program when the practitioner has little to go on but wit knowledge and determination with approximately one half of the book given to the development of instructional methods and materials in reading writing and basic math local literacies will be especially helpful to those doing literacy work in linguistically diverse settings in much of the developing world the reader will quickly discover that this is a book written by a person who has been there and done that waters has spent more than twenty years in australia and papua new guinea both as a practitioner and a consultant in programs of literacy for adults and children this personal experience plus a thorough knowledge of the professional literature makes local literacies a must for the pioneering literacy worker

this handbook presents the latest theories and findings on parenting from the evolving roles and tasks of childrearing to insights from neuroscience prevention science and genetics chapters explore the various processes through which parents influence the lives of their children as well as the effects of parenting on specific areas of child development such as language communication cognition emotion sibling and peer relationships schooling and health chapters also explore the determinants of parenting including consideration of biological factors parental self regulation and mental health cultural and religious factors and stressful and complex social conditions such as poverty work related separation and divorce in addition the handbook provides evidence supporting the implementation of parenting programs such as prevention early intervention and treatments for established issues the handbook addresses the complementary role of universal and targeted parenting programs the economic benefits of investment in parenting programs and concludes with future directions for research and practice topics

featured in the handbook include the role of fathers in supporting children's development, developmental disabilities and their effect on parenting and child development, child characteristics and their reciprocal effects on parenting, long distance parenting and its impact on families, the shifting dynamic of parenting and adult child relationships, the effects of trauma such as natural disasters, war exposure and forced displacement on parenting. The handbook of parenting and child development across the lifespan is an essential reference for researchers, graduate students, clinicians and therapists and professionals in clinical child and school psychology, social work, pediatrics, developmental psychology, family studies, child and adolescent psychiatry and special education.
